INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES AT CRANDALL

Are you unsure about your future career plans? If so, Interdisciplinary Studies may be your ideal major. This liberal arts program allows you to explore the full range of academic disciplines instead of focusing your education in a single area.

Interdisciplinary Studies is a true liberal arts program. When you pursue this major you may complete no more than 10 courses (30 credit hours) in any one discipline and are required to take the Interdisciplinary Studies Senior Seminar program.

Equipped with the knowledge gained while earning this widely focused degree, you will be prepared to pursue advanced education or enter the workforce in business or other fields requiring a liberal arts education.

What to expect when you graduate

Students who hold a B.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies have a wide variety of career options. Many go on to complete advanced degrees in education, seminary, law school or graduate school. Crandall graduates with this liberal arts degree have gone into finance, business management, public relations, marketing and politics.

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Interesting Courses You May Take

Contemporary Youth Culture – Gain an introduction to contemporary adolescent subcultures in Canada. The influences of media, family and friends upon adolescents are examined, as are adolescent attitudes toward sexuality, music, television and other elements of popular culture.

Introduction of Global Missions – Explore global missions and get an introduction to the cross-cultural mission experience. The course introduces the theology of missions and provides an overview of the history of global missions from 1850 to today. It examines contemporary issues facing the missions' movement including the following: the AIDS epidemic, the indigenous church and contextualization of the gospel and how these issues affect the strategies used in modern missions.

Leadership – Examine classic and contemporary issues in leadership theory and practice. Topics covered include leadership behaviours and substitutes, the role of the followers in the leadership process and transformational leadership.
